# DISTRICT UPDATES & INFORMATION

- The annual Area Cleanup Program, for Taylorsville, concluded June 14th.
- There are currently 553 Green Waste subscribers in Taylorsville who have helped divert 212 tons of green waste from the landfill this year. It is never too late for residents to subscribe to the Green Waste Program.
- Usage of the public glass collection container, at Salt Lake Community College, is down 87% from last year. WFWRD is coordinating with the college's Sustainability Coordinator to promote the site for students and the community.
- Our curbside glass subscription program, in partnership with Momentum Recycling, currently has over 900 subscribers. This program will expand District-wide within the next few years.
  - We are currently planning to expand the option for curbside glass collection services in Taylorsville next Spring.



# DISTRICT UPDATES CONTINUED

- The Recycling contracts with Rocky Mountain Recycling and Waste Management have been renewed. We are working closely with all of our community partners to educate our customers on the best practices for recycling to keep our costs low.
- The annual leaf bag program began on October 1 with the distribution of leaf bags to residents. The collection period begins October 15 and continues through November 30. Residents can pick up leaf bags at Taylorsville City Hall, and can drop them off at: South Ridge Park, Vista Park, and Valley Ball Complex. Residents can also use their own bags.
- Our Administrative Control Board membership will be expanding in 2017 to include the newly incorporated townships of Copperton, Emigration Township, Kearns, Magna, White City, and the City of Millcreek. Twelve municipalities will be represented along with two representatives from the Salt Lake County Council to represent the remaining unincorporated areas and serve as a regional representative.





# REDUCE, REUSE, RECYCLE AND RETHINK TONNAGE AND DIVERSION: 3<sup>RD</sup> QUARTER COMPARISON FOR 2015 & 2016


Currently, Taylorsville residents represent the largest city in the district with 16.4% of our households.

Recycle tonnages are slightly lower during the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter of 2016, but tonnages are generally consistent in the 900 ton range per quarter.


Refuse and Green Waste numbers are higher in 2015 due to Area Cleanup occurring in the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter, while it took place in the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter this year.

Taylorsville residents have used 89 landfill vouchers paid by the District during the 3<sup>rd</sup> Quarter 2016 (267 YTD).

# 3<sup>RD</sup> QUARTER YEAR-TO-DATE COMPARISONS FOR TAYLORSVILLE AND DISTRICT-WIDE

Residents of Taylorsville diverted 18.6% of waste away from the landfill during January through September this year, totaling \$94,924 in savings, compared to a District-wide total diversion rate of 18.9%, totaling \$670,771 in savings.


## Savings in Landfill Fees by Taylorsville's Efforts:

Recycling: \$88,243 saved for diverting 2,500 tons of recycling from the landfill.

Green Waste: \$5,827 saved for diverting 378 tons to composting versus landfill.

Glass Recycling: \$854 saved for diverting 27 tons of glass recycling from the landfill.
